

From the Pastor's Desk: Father Paul Cao

Divine Mercy This weekend, we celebrate the Second Sunday of Easter, which is known as Divine Mercy Sunday. Pope Saint John Paul II at the canonization of St. Faustina on April 30, 2000 declared: "It is important then that we accept the whole message that comes to us from the word of God on this Second Sunday of Easter, which from now on throughout the Church, will be called 'Divine Mercy Sunday.'" So we have this celebration as a result of the life and holiness of St. Maria Faustina Kowalska (1905-1938). She is one more proof of what can be accomplished in only a short time on earth.

Beginning on February 22, 1931, Our Lord began appearing to St. Faustina and revealing to her a wonderful message of God's mercy for all people. This simple, uneducated but courageous woman, was given a great mission by God, a message that our world desperately needs to hear.

At one point, Our Lord spoke to St. Faustina and said:

"Paint an image according to the pattern you see, with the signature: Jesus, I trust in You. I desire that this image be venerated, first in your chapel, and then throughout the world." And again: "I promise that the soul that will venerate this image will not perish. I promise victory over its enemies already here on earth, especially at the hour of death, I Myself will defend it as My own glory."

We have a beautiful painting of an image of Divine Mercy in our chapel at St. Celestine and on the left side of the sanctuary above the tabernacle at St. Cyprian. I've seen a lot of people lighting the candles and praying in front of the Divine Mercy Image. I encourage you to please pray the Divine Mercy chaplet

to ask Jesus, the Divine Mercy, to pour out His grace and blessing upon us and have mercy on us and the whole world. Jesus, I trust in You.

Be sure to remember that on the first Friday of each month at 3 PM at St. Celestine, we have a Holy Hour when we pray the Divine Mercy chaplet.



Today, Divine Mercy Sunday, we will have a Divine Mercy Holy Hour and pray the Divine Mercy chaplet at 3 PM at St. Celestine. Please come join us and offer our prayers for peace in the world, and especially pray for peace in Ukraine and Gaza.

Let us pray that we may trust totally in God's love and mercy for us.



On Old Songs and Everyday (Easter) People

I heard "Everyday People" by Sly and the Family Stone the other day. I'm pretty sure it came out when I was in high school, and I was in high school a lo-o-o-ng time ago. Years later, I taught the Quality Assurance portion of the training program that my old employer ran to introduce new employees to all parts of the business. I used to sing part of Everyday People's hook ("Different strokes for different folks") to my class back then to make the point that some of our member-owners wanted things done one way, and others, another way, and that we had to accommodate all ways.

But Everyday People's message runs much deeper, and like a lot of great old-time rock and pop songs, this one could have been written today, for the message is unchanged. Without being preachy, the song preaches volumes on the importance of inclusion and just getting along with others, regardless of their race or social class. "Sometimes I'm right and I can be wrong/ My own beliefs are in my song/ The butcher, the banker, the drummer and then/ Makes no difference what group I'm in/ I am everyday people, yeah, yeah..."

As are we all. Everyday people, I mean. In each chorus, the band members drive the point home, singing over and over (and over): "I am everyday people." As I hear it, this means that we are all part of a much larger and a much more importantwhole. And this reminds me a little bit of the vine and the branches, you know? We are the body of Christ. Even on our bad days. Luke puts it this way in today's first reading from Acts: "The community of believers was of one heart and mind..." Sly and Co. put it this way: "I am no better and



neither are you/ We're all the same, whatever we do..."

And I sense that we are especially the same as we gather on this Second Sunday of Easter/ **Divine Mercy** Sunday. We know about the empty tomb. We may not fully grasp it, just like the Eleven (sans

Thomas) on the evening of that first day of the week. As John writes it in the Gospel, they are all inside with the doors locked when just like that, Jesus appears in their midst. Well, how might we have reacted if the friend we'd abandoned and essentially left for dead were to appear suddenly before us? Terrified, maybe? But "Peace be with you," Jesus says. And not once, but twice. And a third time a week later when Thomas shows up.

We are everyday people, my friends. We're nothing special. But at the same time, we are crazy special, because we buy into something that much of the world does not: the empty tomb, the burial garments set aside, the risen Christ. Oh, we're all on a faith journey. But so were Peter and the disciple Jesus loved at the tomb last week when they saw and believed. And so are the disciples today in the locked room. And so, certainly, is Thomas. But every day, we everyday people are finding our way. And in deference to Sly and the Family Stone, there's something song-worthy about all of this... Sometimes the truth's too good to be so/ But this truth is Gospel, God's manifesto/ The prophets, the preachers, the folks in the pews/ Everyday family, just diggin' the True/ Everyday Easter people, yeah, yeah...



Written in the Wounds

For all the condemnation Thomas the Doubter has received in 2000 years of homilies, I think there's something to admire in him.

Thomas is not unique. We all waver at some point, overcome by hesitation, distracted by the clamor of the world which seeks at every turn to shout above the whisper of the divine.

Thomas knows what he saw on Good Friday: his friend nailed to a cross, a sword driven through his body. He saw the blood and the water. He saw these things with his own eyes, eyes given to him by God, eyes which have never failed him before. And God doesn't ask us to suspend reality to believe in Him. He only asks us to be discerning about how that reality is interpreted in our hearts.

Thomas knows the man before him is either a fraud, preying on the hopes and anxieties of the traumatized disciples, or he is the Christ, the Savior of the world, accomplisher of impossible things. But where to look, to tell the difference?

Satan once appeared to the great mystic saint, Teresa of Avila, disguised as Jesus. She knew instantly that he was a fraud. Enraged, he demanded to know where his deception had failed. "You have no wounds," she told him simply.

Could we have accepted a savior who did not bleed? I don't think we could, because sooner or later, we would all stand before him and say, "Here is where the world hurt me. Here, and here, and here. What about you?" Christ can point to his hands, his feet, his side. "Here, and here, and here," he can say. "And I overcame them all."

It's the wounds, you see. The truth is in the wounds.

Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" — John 20:28

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

After a civil divorce, is a Catholic obligated to pursue an annulment?

Answer:

Many Catholics are not exactly sure what an annulment does. An annulment does not deny that a marriage took place, nor does it deny that there once was love. It does not mean that people say anything untrue, such as they never loved each other or that everything in their marriage was wrong. An annulment does not negate children, nor make them illegitimate. An annulment addresses the spiritual aspect of marriage. In effect, an annulment says that at the time of the wedding, there was either something present or something absent that prevented the sacrament from taking place. It is a spiritual determination that, if granted in the affirmative, allows a person to marry in the Church.

Annulments have no legal standing and are unable to be used in a civil court. Therefore, a Catholic has no moral obligation to pursue an annulment. However, when the tragedy of divorce occurs, and there is no hope for reconciliation, annulments may help bring some spiritual closure to a person's life. Some people have found the process to be healing and others have found it to be difficult. Speak to your priest or a member of the Diocesan Tribunal staff to decide what is best for you. Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." - Jn 20:28-29



Respect Life News

Top Reasons to Oppose Assisted Suicide: Terminal illness defined dangerously broad; predictions of life expectancy are notoriously inaccurate.

• Assisted suicide laws typically appear to limit eligibility to terminally ill patients who are expected to die within six months but don't distinguish between persons who will die within six months with treatment and those who will die within six months without treatment. This means patients with treatable diseases like diabetes and disabilities requiring ventilator support are eligible for lethal drugs since they would die within six months without treatment. Diagnoses of terminal illness and predictions of life expectancy are notoriously inaccurate.

• According to official data collected by Oregon's health department, lethal drugs have already been given to Oregon patients with less predictable conditions like chronic respiratory or cardiac disease and even "benign and uncertain" tumors.

Untreated pain is not among the top reasons cited for taking lethal drugs.

• According to official annual reports, in 2016, 90% of Oregon patients seeking lethal drugs said they were "less able to engage in activities making life enjoyable" and were "losing autonomy," and 49% cited being a "burden" on family, friends or caregivers. In Washington, 52% cited being a "burden." In both states concern about pain was cited as the second to last reason for seeking lethal drugs (35%).

Definition of self-administration opens door to euthanasia

• Can others take an active role in ending the patient's life? Oregon law speaks of the patient as ingesting" medication to end his or her life. Washington law says patients will "self-administer" the drugs, but defines "selfadminister" to mean "ingesting."But "ingesting" ordinarily means absorbing or swallowing; so this does not seem to bar others from administering the drugs. If such action is in accord with the Act, it may not be treated as a homicide.
