On Taking Thy Beak from Out of My Heart, and John 3:16

I'm a longtime fan of Poe's *The Raven*. I committed it to memory years ago because I love the rhyming pattern. I even wrote a Valentine's Day poem to my wife a while back (Once upon a February when my heart was light and airy/ Dreaming of a girl I knew in college many years before...) modeled after Edgar Allan's classic. There are a lot of poems I wish I had written. *The Raven* is near the top of the list.

The work is about a sad lover missing his lost Lenore. The man is visited by a cryptic raven who sits above his door saying only "Nevermore" (as in, nevermore will the man see his beloved). Nearing despair, the man says to the bird near the poem's end an extraordinary line that perhaps I can use someday when the moment is exactly right: "Take thy beak from out my heart, and take thy form from off my door."

I think of this line as I consider today's first reading. Not that I can see any ravens chanting "Nevermore" in 2 Chronicles. But I can hear the Israelites saying "Take thy beak from out my heart, and take thy form from off my door" to the book's author. Why? Because the Chronicler doesn't mince words re: the cause of the Babylonian Exile. He puts it directly on the people of Judah: "In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple..."


And the Chronicler doesn't stop there. "Early and often" he writes, "did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place." But God's compassion was rejected, and the Chronicler rails on, explaining that the Israelites

"...mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy."

Can't you hear the Israelites railing back as well? "Take thy beak from out our hearts, and take thy form from off our door"? Also per the Chronicler, Judah's enemies "...burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon..." But who does God choose to rescue the Israelites in the end, enabling their return to—and restoration of—Jerusalem? Cyrus, king of Persia. A foreigner. Crazy.

And five hundred-some years later, God proves his faithfulness to his people all over again—despite the people's unfaithfulness to God-when he sends Jesus to take the nails for us. It's all right there in today's Gospel, specifically, John 3:16 (which, btw, two million people Google every month, according to a survey conducted by World Vision): "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." We can't earn our way into heaven. We can't even un-earn our way into heaven. Unless we choose to. "For by grace you have been saved through faith," the Apostle Paul tells us, "and this is not from you; it is the gift of God." Moreover, it is the gift that keeps on giving-in deference to Poe-evermore...

The Uncomfortable Life in The Light

If you have ever been a woman over the age of 30 who stayed in a budget motel, you know the horror of awakening in a dark room, switching on the bathroom lights and screaming at the shriveled-up she-witch you find hiding there.

And you know the feeling of disappointment that blooms in the pit of your stomach as you realize the shriveled-up she-witch is your own reflection staring back at you beneath the merciless glare of overhead fluorescent lighting.

You may also know the relief of visiting a nice restaurant after dark and catching sight of yourself in the mirror. You lean forward, mesmerized by how different — how matte! How smooth! — the contours of your face look in what we call "forgiving light." But this turn of phrase is simply not correct. It is not light, and it does not forgive. It is darkness, and it merely conceals.

But it feels so much better, doesn't it? Salvation can feel like condemnation, when being lost is all you know. Sometimes it is so much more comfortable to live lost in the shadows.

It is possible to yearn for darkness. Darkness gives cover to so many things. The light has a harshness that can almost seem demanding, exposing. Light can bleach. Light can burn.

"Is this really me?" you think in that budget hotel bathroom, examining acne scars you never saw before and crow's feet that seem to have developed overnight. The answer is yes. Yes, that is really you, all of it, every inch. There's nothing to be afraid of, just step into the light and own it.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

What's the difference between priests and brothers, friars, etc.?

Answer:


The distinctions titles and categories used for priests and the male members of religious communities can be confusing, especially since the categories can sometimes be intertwined as a man can be both a priest and a monk, or a brother and a friar. So, to help to piece the puzzle together, it's important to begin by noting some basic distinctions:

The distinction between priests (who are ordained for sacramental ministry) and brothers (who are non-ordained members of religious communities and who are committed to lives of prayer and service).

Priests: A priest is a man who has been ordained for sacramental ministry and these fall into two categories: A) Diocesan (or Secular) Priests can either be attached to a diocese and who serve under a bishop. Their ministry is usually oriented toward pastoral service. B) Religious Priests are members of religious communities (like the Franciscans, Jesuits, Salvatorians, or Carmelites) and their lives are guided by the special mission and charism of their community. While both kinds of priest practice sacramental ministry, their spirituality and how they live out their priesthood can be very different.

Brothers: Brothers are non-ordained members of religious communities (such as those mentioned above) who live lives committed to prayer and service. Religious priests and brothers serve together in their communities and their ministries include much more than the care of parishes.

Monks, Friars, and Canons: These are broad categories that include religious priests and brothers, and each of these is connected to specific ways of life and spiritualities.



Stations of the Cross

The Stations of the Cross will take place on Friday, March 15 at 7 PM at St. Cyprian. Each Friday in Lent we will be praying the Stations; it will alternate at each church.

There are 14 stations that each depict a moment on Jesus's journey to Calvary. The object of the Stations is to help us to make in spirit, a pilgrimage to the chief scenes of Christ's sufferings and death, and this has become one of the most popular of Catholic devotions. It is carried out by passing from Station to Station, with certain prayers at each and meditation on the various incidents.

Join us on March 28 from 8:30 PM to midnight. We will leave St. Celestine Church and travel by coach bus to churches to visit (plans are still being finalized for which churches we will visit, but the plan is to go to St. John



Cantius, Holy Name Cathedral, Our Lady of the Holy Family, St. Mary of the Angels, and the Shrine of Our Lady of Pompeii, all churches that are well over 100 years old). We will end with night prayer in the chapel at St. Celestine. Please reserve your seat now by calling 708-453-2555. The cost is \$25 and space is limited.

The Visitation to Churches is a devotion that involves traveling to local churches after Mass on the evening of Holy Thursday. These visits recall the final places Jesus went from his arrest on Holy Thursday to his death on Good Friday. In each church, the pilgrim kneels before the



Altar of Repose, meditates on the appropriate Scripture, and offers prayers and adoration. In this way, pilgrims seek to spiritually accompany Christ as he enters his Passion.

Adults: \$10 Students: \$5 Children Preschool and under: Free bowl of in-house pasta


