From the Pastor's Desk: Fr. Paul Cao

Pet Blessing On Saturday,
October 4, we will have a pet
blessing on the Feast Day of St.
Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of
animals. The tradition of blessing
animals is inspired by St. Francis,
who had a deep love for all of
God's creatures. Please bring your
pets for the blessing at the parking
lot at St. Cyprian at noon or in front
of the 76th Court entrance of St.
Celestine church at 1 PM.

Religious Education Last Saturday, September 13th, 195 students and their parents gathered in church to begin the Religious Education Program with the celebration of the Eucharist. It was good to see so many children and parents come back again to learn about Jesus. We also held a Mass of the Holy Spirit last week for our school.

In my homily, I talked about the two newest saints that Pope Leo canonized a few weeks ago: St. Pier Giorgio Frassati and St. Carlo Acutis (see photo on right). They were both saints who died at a young age

and can be a great influence of faith on your children, especially St. Carlo Acutis, who died at the age of 15.

St. Carlo was a regular teenager. He loved video games, soccer, and computers. However, he lived with extraordinary spiritual maturity, reminding us that sanctity isn't only for monks, priests, or those in remote places. It's possible here and now, in the middle of modern life. I told them that you don't have

to be perfect or live apart from the world to become holy. God works through our everyday choices.

St. Carlo was also passionate about technology and taught himself programming and web design. He created a website cataloging Eucharistic miracles around the world—a project that continues to evangelize today. I encouraged the children to use the internet and technology or social media to spread truth, beauty, and goodness.

I told the children and parents to learn from St. Carlo, who had a deep love for the Eucharist. He went to Mass daily and often spent time in Eucharistic adoration. He called the Eucharist his "highway to heaven." I asked the parents to take this program seriously and ensure their children learn about their faith by

of faith for

them. Bring your children to church every Sunday so they can be closer to Jesus and put into practice what they have learned from Religious Education.

I'm sure many parents are willing to take their children to practice sports without hesitation because they want their children to do well. It is the same way with faith. We need to practice our faith by coming to worship God every Sunday and building a good relationship with





Jesus in the Eucharist.

We have a Family Mass on the first Sunday of the month at 11 AM and a Liturgy of the Word for children on the second and fourth Sundays of the month at 11 AM. I hope to see many children at these masses.

Let us ask St. Pier Giorgio Frassati and St. Carlo Acutis to intercede for us, especially for our children, that they may follow the examples of these two saints and live a life of holiness in this modern world. Along with our new saints, please remember to ask our parish patron saint, St. Mother Theodore Guerin, to intercede for us for the growth of our parish (see page 9 of this bulletin).



Mini Reflection: The parable of the rich man and Lazarus highlights a reality that we often wish to ignore: at some point, we will run out of chances, and it's not because God tires of giving them to us.

Snow Days and Second Chances

Yesterday morning, my kids were playing outside in the snow, and I decided to take advantage of the quiet house to make a few important phone calls.

Fool. I forgot Murphy's Law of Parenting, which dictates that as soon as you dial a phone number, a bomb of irritation and neediness explodes within the heart of your loudest child. Sure enough, as soon as the person on the other end of the line picked up, my son was at the back door, whimpering loudly. Horror of horrors, he had snow in his boot.

I gestured to the phone. He whimpered more loudly. I mouthed and mimed threats. He threw his boot at me. I gave him The Look. He started to scream.

Well, needless to say, the phone call didn't go well, and my son's snow day was cut short. He begged for a second chance, but I explained to him that life doesn't always give you second chances. The phone call was over. Ruined. I couldn't get it back.

But that's when I remembered that moms have a superpower: creating second chances where none had existed before. So I told him that if he could be quiet while I made the rest of my calls, he could go back outside.

My son is young right now. I give him lots of second chances because second chances help him learn. Second chances are the training wheels of life.

I dread the day when the training wheels come off, and I can't save him from his bad decisions. I think every parent does.

The parable of the rich man and Lazarus highlights a reality that we often wish to ignore: at some point, we will run out of chances, and it's not because God tires of giving them to us. It's because a truly endless supply of chances would strip us of our free will. It would deny us the right of being taken at our word — and God respects us too much to do that.

My son saved his snow day. It's a good reminder: take the second (and third and fourth) chance. Don't wait for the next one.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Can a divorced Catholic receive holy Communion?

Answer:

Unfortunately, too many people today — Catholics and non-Catholics alike — mistakenly believe that divorce separates one from the Communion of the Church and that divorced persons may not receive Communion. However, as the Church has communicated in a number of places, the issue at hand is not the reality of divorce, but is more often the reality of re-marriage outside of the Church (such as in the case of a Catholic who was previously married within the Church, divorced, and remarried without receiving an annulment).

Divorced persons are called to live chastely as single people and to observe the same call to avoid sin as anyone else who desires to receive the Eucharist. Beyond this, however, Pope Francis has reminded us that the healing power of the Eucharist can be especially significant for those who have "endured separation, divorce, or abandonment ... divorced people who have not remarried, and often bear witness to marital fidelity, ought to be encouraged to find in the Eucharist the nourishment they need to sustain them in their present state of life." (Amoris Laetitia, no. 242) Moreover, he continues, "The local community and pastors should accompany these people with solicitude, particularly when children are involved or when they are in serious financial difficulty." (AL, no 242)

As Pope Francis has also reminded us, the Eucharist is "not a prize for the perfect," but "a powerful medicine and nourishment" (*Evangelii Gaudium*, no. 47). Because we all stand in need of healing and wholeness, the Church invites all who seek to live their faith in integrity and devotion to come and receive the grace offered in the Eucharist.

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Gospel Meditation Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

I am embarrassed to admit that I frequently find myself dining and socializing with people who have millions and sometimes billions of dollars. I've eaten more caviar, lobster and wagyu steak than most people on the planet. I justify it by saying it's part of my job. But I have seven pairs of nice jeans and expensive shoes.

So it is rather uncomfortable to hear Our Lord say: "My child, remember that you received what was good in your lifetime, while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented" (Luke 16:25). Fellow rich people (and if you're American, you're rich), do we not vehemently though quietly object to this parable's karma-esque reward system? Why bless the rich man just to curse him later? And curse Lazarus just to bless him later? So Americans go to hell, while Burundians and Afghans go to heaven? What is going on?

One clue is that the condemned rich man doesn't complain of injustice. Rather, he simply begs to help his brothers to repent. Of what? We don't know exactly. Perhaps another clue is that the rich man now seems more like the downtrodden Lazarus. He knows what it is to be hungry and thirsty, to be wounded in the gutter; that he deserved that, not fancy meals and clothes. Maybe the rich man finally understands how to receive true blessings, but it is too late for him. But not for me. Not for us.

Paul encourages Timothy to be a strong and faithful leader, focusing on the return of Jesus and the goal of eternal life. Who encourages you in your faith life?


Gospel:

Remember the Feast Day of St. Mother Theodore Guerin (St. Theodora)

Here is a timeline of St. Mother Theodore Guerin's life, from the website of the Sisters of Providence: spsmw.org.

From France to Indiana, Saint Mother Theodore Guerin (St. Theodora) lived an impactful life that still continues to inspire. She is remembered as a woman devoted to prayer, an educator, caregiver and leader. She was a champion of justice and was empathetic to those who suffered, inspiring the work of her Sisters of Providence of Saint Mary-of-the-Woods today.

October 2, 1798 Anne–Therese is born in France From a young age she faced many challenges. Her trust in Providence—the protective care of God—helped her accomplish many things. After the tragic deaths of both her brothers and her father, young Anne—Therese spent many years taking care of her mother and sister. Her deep desire to serve God would have to wait.



1823 Sister St. Theodore

At the age of 25 her mother finally allowed her to follow her dream and devote her life entirely to God. Saint Mother Theodore entered religious life

with the Sisters of Providence of Ruillé sur—Loir, France. It was around this time that she began having health issues that would plague her for the rest of her life. This did not deter her. As a new sister, Sister Saint Theodore Guerin was sent to various parishes in France where she taught, helped the poor and cared for the sick.

1840 Missionary to Indiana

When the bishop of Vincennes, Indiana requested sisters to come to the New World to help with the influx of Catholic immigrants, Saint Mother Theodore was thought to be the only woman who could undertake such a demanding mission. The journey was long and difficult. After traveling for nearly three months Saint Mother Theodore and her five companions arrived only to discover they were in the remote wilderness of Indiana known as Saint Mary-of-the-Woods. There was not a village or a house in sight. Life was not going to get any easier.

1841 Ministry and Expansion

Despite the obstacles, Saint Mother Theodore was able to open an academy for girls in less than a year. Once this was done she continued forward and established schools throughout Indiana and Eastern Illinois. She also opened two orphanages in Vincennes and a free pharmacy at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods and Vincennes.

1856 Death of St. Mother Guerin

On May 14, 1856, Mother Theodore died at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods and was buried there.

2006 Canonized a Saint

On October 15, 2006 at St. Peter's Square in Rome, Mother Theodore was canonized and received the title "Saint" from the Catholic Church. She is designated in the Vatican's official record as Saint Theodora.

Today

The legacy lives on. St. Mother Theodore Guerin's life and words continue to inspire thousands. You can visit St. Mother Theodore's final resting place at the Shrine of St. Mother Theodore Guerin at Saint Mary-of-the-Woods, Indiana. We have been a combined parish under St. Mother Guerin's patronship for 7 1/2 years. Her Feast Day is October 3.

OCIA

The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is a process by which adults explore the Catholic faith and ordinarily become members of the Church.

The program consists of several months of instruction in the teachings, beliefs, customs, and practices of the Catholic faith. Those who complete the process receive the sacraments, usually Baptism, First Communion, and Confirmation, or a combination of those, at Easter.

WHO IS THE OCIA INTENDED FOR?

- Adults and Teens who have never been baptized.
- Adults and Teens who have been baptized in another Christian denomination.
- Adults and Teens who were baptized Catholic but never received First Communion or Confirmation.

Teen Classes meet on Tuesdays from 7 to 8:30 PM in St. Cyprian Rectory beginning on September 23. Adult Classes meet on Thursdays from 7 to 8:30 PM in the St. Cyprian Rectory beginning on September 25. The Sacraments are celebrated at the Easter Vigil. 


A Visit from the Archbishop of Milwaukee and His Mom

Gospel for September 28, 2025
